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CES Update

Cooperative Extension is part of the Institute of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Extension, University of Alaska Fairbanks. Pete Pinney continues as the Director with Jodie Anderson as the Associate Director, with her focus on research.

Food Security is a current need to which CES contributes. instructing people how to grow and harvest, make healthy food, reduce food waste, to preserving food for home use are continuing topics. Agribility programs, cottage food production standards, food cost survey, and food safety manager certification are a few of the ways in which we people work with who disabilities and work with food business needs.

In the Healthy Living area CES programs continue on chronic disease self management, diabetes self management, diabetes prevention, family nutrition education, family economic strategies (budgeting).

Preparing for Emergencies is a strong focus area. The current pandemic keeping people in their homes, floods and wild fires endangering homes, and strong winds causing power outages cause many to shelter in place or prepare to leave quickly.
